Tsze-chang was learning with a view to official emolument.

#### Confucius:

Hear much and put aside the points of which you stand in doubt, while you speak cautiously at the same time of the others, then you will afford few occasions of blame.

See much and put aside the things which seem perilous, while you are cautious at the same time in executing your actions, then you will have few occasions for repentance.

When one creates few occasions for blame in his words and few occasions for repentance in his conduct, he would be on the way to get emolument.

子張學干祿

Tsze-chang was learning with a view to official emolument.

Official emolument: Good position with authority and compensation.



#### Tsze-Chang:

- 48 years junior than Confucius.
- Clean and handsome appearance. Solid family financial background. Wide social network. Strong connection with others with high virtues. High interest in pursuing position related to administrative governmental affairs.









失在有些邪闢,喜歡文過飾非。在《論語·先進》裡孔子又說子張"師也過",即認為子張性格有些過於張揚,認為他沒有達到中庸之道。

Some character flaws with being a bit wicked and writing to talk about others' flaws to cover own shortcomings. In Confucius Analects, Confucius also said that Tsze-Chang's character is a little too flamboyant, hence he has not reached the virtue in a noble person as described in the Doctrine of the Mean.



A person with virtue seeks and obtains official emolument via the rightful and Tao-centric way via his words and conduct.

Hence, Confucius explained to him that one needs to focus on self improvement / self reform, with sufficient growth and mastery of innate virtues, realization, and self-restraint to be in consideration of official emolument.





## What is the moral of the Bamboo tree story?

#### From Previous Conversations from Confucius Analects

誠者,天之道也;誠之者,人之道也。誠之者,擇善而固執之者也。

Sincerity is the way of Heaven. Attainment of sincerity is the way of men. He, who attains sincerity, chooses what is good and firmly holds it.



Bamboo is viewed as a symbol of traditional Chinese values.

Four Gentlemen: Plum, orchid, bamboo & chrysanthemum.

Three Friends in Winter: Pine, bamboo & plum.

#### Bamboo:

Deep root > Resoluteness 堅決

Tall, straight stem → Honor 榮譽

Hollow interior → Modesty 謙虚

Clean and spartan exterior > Chastity 貞潔



#### Five Cardinal Virtues:

Innate Virtues. Foundation and Root in Our Life, e.g. bamboo trees.

Charity.

Wisdom 智
Not knowledge. Innate intelligence from True Self.

Righteousness 信

Faithfulness.

Benevolence

**Mencius on Five Cardinal Virtues:** 

Benevolence, righteousness, propriety, wisdom, and trustworthiness are not welded onto me from the outside.

They are that which I have always had. These five virtues are inherent in all people.

Propriety

Resoluteness.

Self Improvement / Self Reform
Growth and Mastery of Innate Virtues,
Realization, and Self-Restraint

Maintain proper order and respect.

Morals and conducts in line with what is proper.

## Holy Teaching from Confucius Analects

多聞闕疑,慎言其餘,則寡尤。

## <u>Paraphrase</u>

Listen and observe extensively.

Put aside things which you have found doubtful and inappropriate (after careful deliberation based on true self and holy teachings. Rely on innate wisdom.)

Speak cautiously (with sufficient substance / knowledge inside) and act deliberately with careful planning and execution.

You will commit less missteps (for blame or regrets), with inner gravity based on virtues, knowledge, calm, focus, care, and deliberation. External rewards would come at the appropriate time when you least expect it.




## **Economic Cycle**

Advice that I wish I heard earlier in my career is "when you make a mistake, give yourself some grace and focus your energy on learning from it and moving on, versus beating yourself up over the mistake."

I feel that women, especially Asian American women, tend to be very hard on themselves. When I was in law school and early in my career, I internalized every mistake – thinking that it meant I was a failure.

A few years ago, I had the opportunity to join a women's leadership development program through the Texas Women's Foundation. Through that group of women and our coach, I was able to start shifting that negative way of thinking which was holding me back.

We all make mistakes because we are human. What is important is the next step you take after making that mistake. Instead of telling myself that my mistake proves that I am not good enough – now when I make a mistake, I reflect on what I did to contribute to the mistake and then focus on positive steps I can take to change those factors next time so that I can learn from the mistake. And then I work on moving on.

It doesn't mean that I take my mistakes more lightly, but I use my energy in a much more productive way that helps me improve – and be kinder to myself. We can all use more of that!

In Tao: Be confident and assertive to advocate for the cause that you believe in and do so in a respectful way in accordance with holy teaching.


